To Provost and Vice President Jennifer Evans-Cowley:

I wish to declare my utter shock and disbelief at the conduct and behavior of your esteemed school in the summary removal of all the Chinese scholars enrolled in your College through the China Scholarship Council of China. Started as a Black-American College, your school has a long tradition of racial and ethnic pride. It also symbolizes the values of justice and equality for all people. The treatment of the Chinese scholars in expelling them as a group is without precedent. It is racially and national-origin motivated, something that is explicitly prohibited by the US Constitution. Foreign students, as a class, are protected by the US Constitution. Their summary removal from the College appears to be a serious violation of their constitutional rights to equal protection and due process of the law under the 14th Amendment.

On a personal level, the pain and agony you have caused these highly accomplished scholars are immense. You may know that in many of their cases, their families saved and scraped up all their money to send them to your school to learn a skill and obtain life experiences about America's humanity and democratic values. This is certainly not the kind of democratic value we are teaching them. No one should be treated as a cast-off - something you just toss away at whim, without human dignity. For these individuals, their lives are ruined. What you have done to these scholars is unbecoming of any academic institution. And if in fact, the reasons for what you are doing is political, then shame on you for succumbing to these outside pressures without regard for the integrity of your school and the livelihood of these students.

We recognize there is a cold war going on between the US and China. But these Chinese scholars are here for genuine learning. The fact that the US and China are not on friendly terms should not affect the people to people exchanges, which will in fact support and promote a better relationship between the two countries, something I believe every American would want. These scholars met all the qualifications for admission to your College. Other than the politics at play, there is absolutely no reason to treat them in such a humiliating manner.

I urge you to rescind the illegal termination of their studies and welcome them into the school. This is a wrong that should be addressed. Thank you for your consideration.
