



COMMUNITY INITIATIVE LAUNCHES TO RAISE AWARENESS AND STOP ANTI-ASIAN HATE

Special whistles to be distributed for protection and solidarity beginning April 19



New York, NY, April 14, 2021—In the wake of recent acts of violence and harassment targeting the Asian community, organizations across New York City and nationwide have joined together to support a new initiative spearheaded by Agnes Hsu-Tang, an archaeologist and international cultural heritage policy advisor on the faculty at Columbia University and a trustee of the New-York Historical Society. Beginning April 19, customized yellow whistles with the words “We Belong” will be distributed through a network of community-based organizations and at the New-York Historical Society, New York’s first museum.

“The Yellow Whistle™ is a symbol of self-protection and solidarity in our common fight against historical discrimination and anti-Asian violence,” said Agnes Hsu-Tang. “The whistle is a simple gadget with a universal purpose—to signal alarm and call for help. We chose the color yellow because it has been weaponized as a mark of xenophobia against Asians throughout American history. We are whistleblowing to fight back against the stereotype that Asians are a silent minority. We stand proudly as Americans—with all Americans—because we belong.”

“New-York Historical strives to educate and illuminate the broadest possible public on the histories of the nation’s diverse populations,” said Louise Mirrer, president and CEO of New-York Historical. “We are proud of Trustee Agnes Hsu-Tang’s efforts, through The Yellow Whistle campaign as well as exhibitions and public programs in which she has been involved at New-York Historical and elsewhere, to ensure that the founding principles of our nation, of equality and justice for all, are understood, appreciated, and uniformly applied. We hope that our exhibition currently on view, *Dreaming Together*, will be a companion piece to The Yellow Whistle campaign, raising the consciousness of visitors around the Asian diasporic experience, today as well as in the past.”

“Asian Americans have long been stereotyped as ‘perpetual foreigners’, despite our many contributions to the American society and many have lived in this country for generations,” said Vincent Wang, national president, Asian Pacific Islander American Public Affairs Association (APAPA) and chair, Ohio Chinese American Association (OCAA). “The Yellow Whistle™ project creatively combines a practical design with a powerful message ‘We Belong’ that will amplify the Asian American voice. APAPA is organizing a nationwide ‘Unity against Hate’ rally on May 15 along with groups from the Black, Jewish, Latino, LGBT, and other marginalized communities to stand in solidarity against prejudice and hate. The

Yellow Whistle™ is a wonderful tool to empower our grassroots efforts.”

“This is a much needed and highly practical strategy to address anti-Asian violence,” said Frank H. Wu, president, Queens College. “The recent attacks are not random but racial. Out of tragedy we have seen people come together to recognize the need to do something.”
